

Over the past three years, a global Disaster Risk Reduction and Disaster Management Working Group-made up of 12 churches and related agencies across the Anglican Communion has been creating a comprehensive resource for Community-Based Disaster Risk Reduction and Management. The "Pastors and Disasters Toolkit" is a manual and workbook of practical tools designed to help improve efforts to respond more effectively to disasters, especially within the context of local Anglican or Episcopal churches and organizations.
